director on almost killing Keanu Reeves As stuntman-turned-director Chad Stahelski watched Keanu Reeves galloping through the streets of Brooklyn on horseback while filming *John Wick: Chapter 3 – Parabellum*, he tried not to let on that he was terrified. "I was like a duck," he recalls. "On the surface I was calm, but underneath I was paddling like crazy and thinking: 'Oh god, please don't kill Keanu Reeves!"

Stahelski's concern for the daredevil action star went far beyond a filmmaker fretting over his most valuable commodity. The director and star have been close ever since Stahelski acted as a stunt double for Reeves on 1999's sci-fi game-changer *The Matrix*.

"Keanu is just a good human being and one of the hardest-working people I know," says Stahelski, who did such a great job, he was made the stunt coordinator for *The Matrix* sequels. "Those films opened the door, career-wise and inspirationally. It showed me the level of precision and creativity that was possible," he adds. Stahelski soon became one of the industry's most sought-after stunt coordinators, working on blockbusters such as *The Expendables* and *The Wolverine*. "I was a very fortunate stunt guy," he says. "I got to hang from helicopters, got blown up, flipped cars – everything a stuntman could do, including choreographing and being part of the filmmaking process."

In 2014 Stahelski took the biggest leap of his career, directing Reeves in *John Wick*, a film that has spawned two sequels so far. He admits the transition has been challenging, especially when, while filming *Chapter 3* in Essaouira, Morocco, he had to deal with an unexpected set invasion. "Because of the fishing boats they have thousands of cats in the city and we didn't want them distracting the dogs we have in the film," Stahelski explains. "So we hired 35 cat wranglers to remove the kitties and put them in temporary 'kitty condos' while we filmed. That took a bit of patience."

Texan Maren Morris - country-pop's hot new singer - is not to be ignored

"Little but loud," is the description on Maren Morris's Instagram feed. And, frankly, who's arguing? Although she stands a wholly respectable 163cm tall, Morris is making a big noise in the music world, following in the footsteps of crossover queens like Kacey Musgraves.

Growing up in Arlington, Texas, Morris spent her childhood trying to make herself heard at her parents' hair salon. Her father bought her a guitar aged 12, and her fate was sealed. Since then, she's worked as a songwriter for Kelly Clarkson, released two highly successful albums, sung on the electro-pop single *The Middle* and performed with Dolly Parton and Miley Cyrus at the Grammys.

"I'll always be rooted in country music," she told the *Evening Standard*. "Being from Texas, it's in my blood. When I sing, there's a twang there that I can't hide. But I am going to write and sing whatever I want."

Her new album, *Girl*, was co-written with Adele collaborator Greg Kurstin, and it should see her profile increase dramatically. Just don't expect her to go quietly. As she says on new song *Flavor*, "Shut up and sing? Well, hell no I won't!" We wouldn't have it any other way.

It's always a thrill knowing that you're staying in a hotel favoured by the great and good. And in LA there's nowhere more glamorous, more iconic or with more star power than the Hollywood Roosevelt. The lobby you walked through earlier? It's where Bill Robinson taught Shirley Temple to tap dance. That pool you're about to jump in? It's piece of art valued at more than \$1 million (the blue squiggles were painted by David Hockney). The diving board? That's where Marilyn Monroe modelled for a suntan lotion commercial way back in the day.

Open since 1927, and next to the Hollywood Walk of Fame, walking through the Roosevelt's doors feels like stepping into a bygone era where you might bump into Clark Gable or dine next to Marilyn. And if there's one icon's presence that lingers, it's hers. It wasn't just one of her favourite haunts then – she stayed in suite 229 for two years while her modelling career was taking off – it's also one of her favourite haunts now. Legend says her ghost still roams the hotel corridors.

For a less spooky celebrity spot, swing by The Spare Room, a speakeasy-style bar where you might catch A-list actors putting The Dude to shame on the mini bowling lane or sipping mezcal cocktails in the corner.

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Leaps and **BOUNDS**

Hong Kong Ballet is forging ahead for its 40th anniversary

What do you get when you cross a classical art form with a fashion-forward aesthetic and one of the world's most visited cities? The answer, if this bright and breezy photograph is anything to go by, is Hong Kong Ballet (HKB), which turns 40 this year. And far from letting this milestone signal a comfortable period of settling down, the company is in the process of staging its biggest, boldest season to date.

"Hong Kong Ballet is one the premier companies in Asia, but it's also the most dynamic and forward-looking," says HKB artistic director Septime Webre. "So we had to make its 40th year special."

But what does that mean in real terms? This year's repertoire of classic and contemporary works will include a world premiere of the timeless *Romeo* + *Juliet*, as well as *Hong Kong Cool*, a mash-up of ballet and high fashion, but HKB will also be staging a series of accessible stunts called *Ballet in the City*. Events include *Friday Night Barre*, where passers-by can watch the company perform ballet exercises in the business district, and *Dance Unites*, where those who fancy themselves as prima ballerinas (and those who don't) can limber up alongside the pros in a series of masterclasses.

"Hong Kong as a city is all about fusion," Webre explains. "It's important that the ballet is an integral part of the cultural and social fabric. It's not enough to connect with audiences in the theatre. By presenting great art for free in locations across the city, we can help thousands of people see themselves as ballet lovers, and the city as a place of creativity and art."

So don't be surprised if you find yourself busting out a pirouette along Victoria Harbour, or a grand jeté in Kowloon City. Just don't blame us if you pull a muscle.

Whether you're a Marvel super-fan who's aching to get their Thor on, or you've just had a really, *really* bad week, Wreck Room is the place to let rip. A pop-up specialising in wanton destruction, it's situated in a derelict-looking building in east London. Walking down the dark corridor, I hear The Prodigy's *Firestarter* in the distance – indeed, the music video could have been shot here.

After a safety briefing, I'm kitted up in protective gear and asked to choose some tunes. I go for Rage Against The Machine and, for a change of pace, Britney Spears. Then I'm ushered into the Wreck Room itself, which contains loading pallets, a selection of weapons, a defunct laptop and a box of rather chintzy crockery.

> *Killing in the Name* throbs to life and I pick up the heaviest baseball bat, set a crocodile ornament on the edge of the pallet, swing back

and – kaboom! – atomise it into a million pieces. Adrenalised, I pick my next target: a 1970s plate about to say hello to Mr Sledgehammer. As I pound it into dust, it's not anger I feel, but an illicit sense of joy.

As a writer, I've been had by plenty of cheap laptops, so when *Toxic* begins, it's payback time. I pick the smallest hammer then – crack! – the screen explodes – bang! – the keys fly out like broken teeth – crunch! – the hard drive disintegrates. That'll teach it and its brethren for crashing when I've got a deadline looming. I go back for the baseball bat, and it all comes flooding out.

By the time Britney stops, I'm sweaty, smiling and sore. I've learned I prefer the baseball bat because the power comes from within; whereas a hammer's heavier so it does the job for you. Basically, Thor's a wuss.

Beyond the AII KY WAY Eat and drink like a Jedi at Disnev

Ever since Luke Skywalker poured himself a tall glass of blue bantha milk in Star Wars, fans have speculated what the bizarre beverage would taste like. Imagine, then, the weight of expectation on the food and beverage team at Galaxy's Edge - two Star Wars-themed areas at Disneyland Park in California and Walt Disney World Resort in Florida - tasked with making the drink a reality. "Yeah, no pressure on this one!" laughs Brian Koziol, food and beverage ace at Walt Disney

World Resort. "We learned the recipe for blue milk was never really defined so we established a few guiding principles: the colour needed to be like in the movie; it needed to be accessible to as many as possible (so gluten-free); the flavours needed to be a touch peculiar; and it needed to taste delicious."

The level of care and attention that went into coming up with a recipe for blue milk - essentially

a frozen smoothie made from rice milk infused with berry and melon flavours - is indicative of all the creative menu options at Galaxy's Edge, an immersive world on the planet Batuu. Visitors can try a chicken dish called fried Endorian tipyip at Docking Bay 7 Food and Cargo, sip a Jedi Mind Trick cocktail at Oga's Cantina, or order a grilled pork sausage wrap at Ronto Roasters, where a pod-racing engine fires the barbecue pit.

"Because there aren't many food references in the films, we could be creative and have fun," says Brian Plasecki, culinary director at Walt Disney World Resort. "At the end of the day, the offerings needed to look and even feel different - not like anything our guests would expect."

Much like the Star Wars movies themselves. the food at Galaxy's Edge is colourful and exciting. "When we created the dishes, we wanted to make certain components stand out - like they might do in the Star Wars universe," explains Plasecki. "So here on Batuu, it's perfectly normal to have green gravy, translucent noodles and purple carrots." May the fork be with you.

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Tel Aviv is a small town with big ideas. With a picturesque beach, fabulous restaurants and a happening nightlife scene, it's enough to make you feel like you've stepped into a movie – but what kind? From romance to epic, action flick to arthouse hit, there's something for everyone in our insider's guide.

The romance

If *When Harry Met Sally...* had been set in Tel Aviv rather than New York, it would never have taken them 12 years to get together. Why? Because the city exudes a playful sexiness that's utterly infectious, with bars and restaurants spilling out of the terraces and on to the streets.

One of the hottest spots is the art-deco Norman Hotel, which was named after the filmmaker Norman Lourie, the owner's late father. Sip on a Pink Vesper martini at the Library Bar, take a lingering evening dip in the rooftop pool, or savour dinner in the courtyard at Alena, where blackand-white films are projected on one wall while good-looking bar stewards whip up cocktails against the other.

The next day, wander hand in hand around Sarona Market, with its piles of olives and neatly stacked falafels. Walk back through the Bauhaus buildings of the White City and grab a seat at HaBasta, an intimate restaurant/wine bar with candlelit corners that are perfect just for two.

When it's time for dinner, those in the know head straight to L28 Culinary Platform. This sleek venue founded by tech start-up types opened earlier this year. If you were in any doubt of its hipster pulling power, the vertical garden, suspended timber panels and rooftop farm should set you straight.

go for a midnight dip at Hatzuk Beach. Swimming costumes? Optional, of course.

The historical drama

With 3,000 years of history, Jaffa is the oldest part of Tel Aviv. Take a stroll through the maze of golden-stone alleys, past domed mosques and saffron-scented markets, and you'll feel like you've been transported into a Ridley Scott epic. But it's also one of the city's coolest spots. Set in a dramatic neo-gothic hospital for >

Christians visiting Jerusalem, The Jaffa Hotel features Damien Hirst artworks on the walls. With its plush golden chairs, vaulted sky-blue ceiling and original stained-glass windows, The Chapel Bar is one of the city's most Instagrammed spots.

Beit Kandinof, a warren of Ottomanera rooms around a fairylight-filled courtyard, is Jaffa's most creative space. There's a restaurant, bar and gallery and – from dusk – DJs spinning house beats. In the summer you can feast on Mediterraneanstyle mezze under a canopy of stars.

But it's not all Shoreditch on sand. Head to Carmel Market, the largest *shuk* (market), on a Friday when locals are stocking up for *shabbat* (sabbath). If you can hear yourself think over the cacophony of vendors and overwhelmed tour-

ists you'll be rewarded with some of the city's best food: huge watermelons, towers of dried fruit, falafel, spicy lamb and aubergine pittas, *halva* (sweets), baklava and more. Take your time – there's a lot to take in.

The arthouse hit

Crouching in a ball over your hands, desperately trying to get your feet in the air as you attempt your first handstand since primary school may not be a classic holiday activity, but at Bascula – Tel Aviv's first urban circus – it's practically mandatory. Whichever way up you're standing, prepare to be caught off-balance by the mixture of graffiti

> classes, drag nights, Pink Floyd tribute concerts and ballet performances.

Head towards the beach and you'll find Beit Romano, a cluster of bars set in one bougainvillea-filled courtyard. Get past the door staff and you'll find huge pizzas, Above Machneyuda in Jerusalem Below the Design Museum

beautiful people, and pulsing Arab and African house that lasts until dawn.

Prefer your creativity a little more curated? Hop on a bus to Holon, where you'll find the Design Museum. From the outside it looks like a giant, ribbon-cut orange peel, but inside it houses a tremendous collection, ranging from butterfly sculptures that transform into fighter jets in shadow to a seesaw that emits colourful sparks and music.

The action movie

At the beach good-looking locals rollerblade along the waterfront in barely there swimming costumes, and tanned students play strenuous games in skin-tight Speedos. Other than taking a pair of >

shears to your wardrobe, the best way to feel like a true Tel Avivian is by stripping off and diving in.

Start your day like Keanu (Reeves) or Kate (Bosworth) with a surf class on Ha'Chof Hamaravi beach. Next to a line of bars that pump out encouraging electro is the Topsea Surfing Centre. Here, at Tel Aviv's oldest surf club, you will find patient instructors who will get even wobbling no-hopers on their feet for a second or two.

Too hungover to face the embarrassment of a wipeout? Coax out your inner Aquaman on a snorkelling trip with the Octopus Diving School on Gordon Beach. Afterwards, why not try Tel Aviv's most popular beach sport? *Beten gav*, the act of lazily bronzing under the Israeli rays, is beloved by locals of all ages, and translates as "stomach-back", because that's the only movement you'll make.

The roadtrip

As everyone from Thelma and Louise to the Griswolds knows, there's nothing like hitting the open road. In Israel one car journey is virtually obligatory: a trip to Jerusalem. The Holy City is about an hour outside of Tel Aviv. Start in the Old City. From the Western Wall to the Dome of the Rock and the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, every site in this single square kilometre has shaped the lives of billions of people today. Booking a good guide to help navigate the crowds is a must, so try Pomegranate Travel.



Away from the bustle is Yad Vashem, Israel's official Holocaust memorial and museum. On top of a wooded hill, it's a powerful, poignant monument to the genocide. Allow at least four hours for the exhibition and the moving memorials. From there, take a taxi to the Israel Museum, home to the Dead Sea Scrolls: the foundation of modern Judaism and some of the most important religious texts on earth.

Restaurant-wise, nowhere rivals Machneyuda. With pumping music, queues around the block and chefs dancing while they cook, this Jerusalem institution is as famous for its raucous atmosphere as it is for its food, which includes polenta ragout and oxtail with Jerusalem artichoke. Book ahead – and if you don't like noise, maybe bring some earplugs.

all of the challenges that she faces. She's a complete badass."

The final episode of season three left fans reeling as Rebecca was shown elderly, bed-ridden and frail, clearly in the last portion of her life.

"It was six hours of hair and make-up that day," says Moore. "It was the last thing we shot for this season and walking on set, people kind of avoided my gaze, avoided eye contact. I understood – it was jarring to look in the mirror for me, too. There's something really humbling about being in that moment, but also utterly heart-breaking. I won't say it's the final moments of her life, but the end is definitely near and that's hard, for the audience and the actor."

Playing a woman from her twenties to her sixties isn't something many actresses get the chance to do. Has it made her more aware of her own mortality?

"I'm excited about ageing," she says. "The big major themes in life are starting to crystallise. I'm not saying that I have it all figured out by any means, but in my thirties things have started to make sense in a way that I just don't think I would have understood a decade or even five years ago. I'm embracing everything that comes along with age – feeling more comfortable in my skin, where I am, the choices I'm making, and the power I have that I've never really acknowledged or felt."

Part of her acceptance of ageing might be due to having started out in the business so young. She was born in New

t makes you cry, and it makes you think about the important things in your life," says Mandy Moore. "It's like pushing on a bruise. We're conditioned to walk through life stoically, compartmentalising and not feeling our feelings. There's something lovely and cathartic about being given the excuse and the permission to do the opposite."

After decades of dark material, amoral antiheroes and bingeable boxsets, today's TV audience is demanding, sophisticated and often cynical. But This Is Us, the fourth season of which begins this month, is nothing like that. An unapologetically earnest, sentimental drama, it focuses on the Pearson clan, a white, middle-class family from Pittsburgh. Flashing back and forth across 40 years, the show follows Jack and Rebecca (Milo Ventimiglia and Moore) and their three offspring (played, as adults, by Chrissy Metz, Justin Hartley and Sterling K Brown) one of whom, Randall, is black and was adopted at birth. Every week, its millions

of viewers – including celebrity fans from Nicole Kidman and Reese Witherspoon to Bill Gates and J-Lo – tune in with tissues at the ready because the show is notorious for prompting mass weeping, as heartstrings are tugged in every direction.

The 35-year-old Moore can also be seen in *The Big Break*, a short film about an office drone (Paul Lieberstein) holding out to be a hero, which is playing onboard. But *This Is Us* remains the headline story, having been nominated for four Emmy awards, including one for Outstanding Lead Actress in a Drama Series for Moore. "It's so lovely to get that acknowledgement," she says now. "It's been the privilege of my career thus far, portraying this woman and every different iteration of her life and Hampshire but grew up in Florida, where, she says, she caught the performing bug hard and fast aged just six years old.

"I remember watching a production of *Oklahoma!* and the girl who sang *Oh*, *What A Beautiful Mornin*' was supremely talented and everybody was captivated by her," she says. "Everybody was spellbound and I thought, 'Oh my god, I want to do that. I want to make people feel that way." She got her parents to pay for singing lessons. "I had it firmly lodged in my brain that I was going to be on Broadway and there was no plan B," she laughs. "No one in my family is remotely creative, so it was a very odd choice for me with my life."

Odd, perhaps, but the universe delivered. At the tender age of 13 she was >

Said friend flew to Florida to meet Moore. "I sang for him and that was it," she says, simply. "I signed a record deal at 15, and started making an album. I went on tour with NSYNC and Backstreet Boys. It's insane to think about now, but in the moment it was like, 'OK, yeah.' I never felt overwhelmed, but that's also the trick of being a young person. I was like, 'Oh, I'm going to London now and I'm doing *Top* of the Pops? OK. Now I'm going to New York and I'm on MTV.' I was fearless. Now, that schedule would feel so gruelling, and I would be a nervous wreck, but all of that just didn't compute when I was young."

So how much creative input was she allowed back then? "Oh, zero," she laughs. "Which is probably smart, because I was 15 and I had maybe French-kissed a boy, but I had no experience of love, no idea what I was even singing about anyway, so making any decisions whatsoever – besides maybe what I wanted to wear – was probably best left to the adults in the room."

When she was 15, she says, letting other people take control was fine. "But as I got older and grew into myself, had some life experience under my belt and discovered music that I really loved, then it became a bigger conundrum. I wanted to be a part of the creative process and that wasn't an easy solution to find."



Moore's musical career was not helped by her 2009 marriage to country-rock singer Ryan Adams, whom she met at the age of 23. Last year, she spoke to the *New York Times* about the relationship, which she now describes as abusive. "It was an entirely unhealthy dynamic. I had no sense of self. I was imperceptible, I was so small in my own world," she said, adding, "It was so lonely. I was so sad. I was lonely with him." She filed for divorce in 2015.

Moore was, she says, "in the midst of this really awful, acrimonious divorce", when

She was also tied into the image of a clean-cut, wholesome teen star, very much "America's sweetheart". "That actually wasn't too far from who I was." she shrugs. "I am a bit of a goody two-shoes. I didn't go to college or have that exploratory phase like most people my age were having. I just jumped right into an adult world and took my job really seriously." She pauses. "Honestly, if it's up to me, I'll go to bed at 8 o'clock. I skipped out of being a fun, exciting young person and just went right to geriatric status. So, when people described me as the girl next door, or America's sweetheart, I was flattered. It only became more of a problem. I think, as an actor trying to break out of that box and show people that I contain multitudes."

she heard a song on the radio by the band Dawes, and posted about it on Instagram.

"I just put up a picture. I didn't tag them. I didn't do any of the things you're supposed to do if you're trying to get someone's attention. I was newly on Instagram and I didn't understand the rules," she laughs. Yet, somehow, the universe stepped in again.

Someone alerted the band's singer/ songwriter Taylor Goldsmith, who suggested they meet. "I was trying to say yes to things I would normally have passed on, and I thought, 'You know what? I should meet this stranger. I should meet some new people in the music industry," Moore recalls. "And, of course, I walked into the restaurant and I just was like, 'Oh goodness, he's so handsome.' We had an epic three-hour-long dinner, and that was it."

The couple got married last November, and have recorded lots of new music together in the meantime, which Moore will begin releasing this autumn. So how does this relationship compare to Rebecca's journey in *This Is Us*?

"I'm excited about hopefully having kids and grandkids one day," she says. "I'm excited about living all of the lives that Rebecca lives. Being part of this show has really deepened my appreciation for what our definition of family is and what's really important in life. And it's the big universal things. When you strip away all the madness that happens in the world nowadays, the only thing that's really important is family and friends." Rebecca, you feel, would approve.

The life and times of JRR Tolkien

ay the name JRR Tolkien and two things are guaranteed: 1) nobody will know what the JRR stands for and 2) everybody thinks of wizards.

John Ronald Reuel Tolkien's famous stories – *The Hobbit* and *The Lord of the Rings* – are the most influential fantasy books ever written and were turned into one of cinema's biggest ever franchises. But who was the creator of Middle Earth?

Born in 1892 in South Africa, but raised in Birmingham, Tolkien didn't have an easy start in life. Indeed, if there was a *Fantasy Idol* TV show, his tragic backstory would win hands down. Aged 12, he was orphaned. His mother, Mabel, who taught him Latin, French, botany and art, and inspired his love of languages, was a particularly crushing loss.

By his mid-twenties, he'd also lost Geoffrey Bache Smith and Robert Gilson in WWI. Alongside Tolkien and Christopher Wiseman, they had been part of the Tea Club and Barrovian Society (TCBS). This group of four pals, from King Edward's school in Birmingham, was Tolkien's first "fellowship".

"This frivolous little group basically bonded into something very profound and tight when the war broke out," explains John Garth, the author of three Tolkien books, including *Tolkien and the Great War*. "They decided that they had a mission to bring light into this dark world through art."

Tolkien truly succeeded in that mission. These great thuds of reality didn't, in fact, kill his imagination – even the





war fired his creativity. In *The Lord of the Rings*, for example, Frodo Baggins clearly shows signs of PTSD after his great journey.

"For Tolkien to go on and have a successful family life, become a great academic and transform an entire literary genre is quite incredible," says Garth. "I think his creativity helped him through, by turning tragedy into art." But then, "Tolkien was imaginative on a whole other level. He didn't just pull a hobbit out of a hat, he worked incredibly hard, taking elements of the things he loved and adding his own ideas."

Tolkien was sent home from the war early with trench fever, going to professorships at the universities of Leeds and Oxford. His wife Edith Bratt, who he'd met after his mother died, was another great influence on his work. He later struck up a friendship with *Narnia* creator CS Lewis, with whom he ran the legendary Oxford pub-dwelling literary discussion group the Inklings.

But it's Tolkien's influence on his readers that's truly inspirational. Upon its release in 1937, *The Hobbit* was an instant success, triggering demand for a sequel, which wouldn't arrive until 17 years later. The worlds, real and imagined, literary and cinematic, were changed forever.

"He was a genius who saw things in a different way," summarises Garth. "He reinvented and reinvigorated fantasy literature, making it relevant to our world."

WHERE EAGLES DARE

Why didn't Frodo just fly to Mordor? The truth about that plot hole

t the end of *The Return of the King*, once the One Ring has been smelted in the fires of Mount Doom (spoilers), it looks very much as if Frodo and Sam's goose is also cooked. However, as they cower on the mountainside, molten rock pelting down, giant eagles appear and pluck them to safety.

This last-gasp rescue has led to a much-discussed and seemingly obvious question: why make the wee hobbits go on an epic and arduous journey to destroy the ring when they could just fly over the volcano and drop it in?

Some argue that the eagles would have been spotted by the Eye of Sauron (which only crumbled once the ring was destroyed) and zapped en route. Others say the ring would have corrupted the eagles, the way it corrupted Smeagol and turned him into Gollum.

Tolkien expert John Garth has two explanations. The first, he says, is fairly basic. "Tolkien wanted a sense of realism in his worlds," he says. "But he was also a great poet and writer, so he knew there needed to be an element of trouble."

The other has more to do with Tolkien's message. "Thematically, it makes sense," says Garth. "If you summon the eagles, you turn them into machines, and the whole story is against using machines to enhance your power: that's what the One Ring is. *The Lord of the Rings* is a tale of weaknesses overcoming strength. So an eagle might well be corrupted: it needed a gentle hobbit with no ambition to take the journey."

Holiday like a hobbit

Staying in a hobbit hole isn't as niche as you might think – there are round-doored underground residences all over the UK. Try the Hidden Hollow in Suffolk, a 2.5m-tall home built into a mound of earth. Surrounded by tangled roots and tall pine trees, this cosy eco home looks just like Bag End. Bookable through Quality Unearthed, it sleeps up to four people, and starts at £100 a night. There are also plenty of good walks in the area for anyone after an unexpected journey.

Mental elf retreat

Everyone knows that the most idyllic part of Middle Earth is the valley of Rivendell, home of the Elves. It was inspired by Lauterbrunnen in Switzerland, where Tolkien went on a hiking trip in 1911. This Alpine village and valley has 72 waterfalls, including some of the highest in Europe, and – being Alpine – offers winter sports, summer trails and allyear-round beer drinking in quaint inns.

No gloom on Doom

The films were shot all over New Zealand, which might be the only place on Earth with a landscape big enough to match the author's imagination. If you're going to visit just one location, then check out Mordor, aka Tongariro National Park. It has volcanic peaks, waterfalls, lakes, the river where Gollum goes fishing, and the slopes of Mount Doom – which you can ski down (orc-free).

Not long after buying the Rachel Bar and Grill in 1988, Pat Travis-Laudenklos saw the light. She and her late husband, Joe Travis, were alone one night after closing, in the diner they'd bought beside a long, straight highway through the vast Nevadan nothingness. "There was this powerful bright light from outside, and suddenly the lights inside started to flicker," says Pat. "There was a strong sense that something was there, this strange presence. We offered it milk and cookies like it was Santa."

If Pat and Joe's encounter sounds a bit like a Spielberg movie, that's partly the result of Hollywood's obsession with extraterrestrial life – seen most recently in *Men in Black: International.* But it was another alien blockbuster, 1996's *Independence Day*, that changed the fate of Nevada State Route 375, a lonely 98-mile road starting two hours north of Las Vegas. The movie was partly set at the tiny town of Rachel, and Area 51 a few miles away. This US Air Force base is a magnet for conspiracy theories. Indeed, such is its association with aliens that 500,000 people have signed up to storm the facility on 20 September and find out the truth. In the wake of *Independence Day*, SR 375 was rebranded the Extraterrestrial Highway, with retrofuturistic signs added along the road. Overnight, it became a kind of anti-tourism destination: a place to come and see almost nothing.

Inspired by their visitation, Pat and Joe renamed their diner the Little A'le'Inn. It already had trailer rooms to house drivers who'd hit cows or run out of gas on the road. Now, they began selling bug-eyed alien mugs, Area 51 number plates and other extraterrestrial ephemera. Soon, Joe was building a rocket with flickering lights, and a child-sized alien holding a sign saying "Earthlings Welcome". It's now the only real establishment in Rachel, a settlement of 50 or so people, most of whom are cattle ranchers; a place that was named in 1977 after Rachel Jones, the first baby to be born here.

While the Little A'le'Inn has quietly become iconic, appearing in the *The X-Files* and *Grand Theft Auto: San Andreas*, not much has changed over the years. The rooms are still basic, and Pat's "world-famous alien burger" has been on the little laminated menu for close to three decades. Joe died in 2003, and Pat's second husband Bill passed away in 2015, but the inn's main appeal is still the warm welcome offered by Pat and her daughter, Connie. "This is a calm, quiet place," Pat, now 75, tells me, standing behind the bar in her alien apron, under a ceiling blanketed in dollar bills signed by guests from across the world. "People come for the aliens, but it's really a bit of fun. We always say to people: don't make up stories to promote our business."

I'd driven north from Las Vegas the day before, quickly finding myself in one of America's strangest, emptiest quarters, where almost a thousand atomic tests were carried out between the 1950s and early >

1990s. At Crystal Springs, a ghost town at the start of the Extraterrestrial Highway, I stop beside a home-made, sign advertising ET Fresh Jerky. I buy a packet of sickly, teriyaki-flavoured dried meat from the trailer-park shop, but resist the sign's invitation to "drop your toxic waste in the cleanest restrooms in Area 51".

Just up the road, the Alien Research Center is a gift shop selling space novelties from a corrugated iron shed. Out front is a three-storey metal alien, gazing across the empty shrub land. Behind the till is Malcolm Harris, a mustachioed man in a cap, and the kind of guy you'd expect would do OK come the alien apocalypse. His brother, George, a Vegas restaurateur and amateur ufologist, built the place in 2001, creating the highway's only real attraction other than the Little A'le'Inn.

Malcolm, a welder for the mining industry, says he often sees things in the skies around here, and he's not talking about flying saucers. On the office computer in a little side room, he brings up a photograph he'd taken of a long, almost perfectly rectangular cloud. "I was watching geese, and this thing appeared from nowhere," he says. "It must have been a thousand feet long, moving silently. The military are testing all sorts round here."

Very few people know exactly what happens at Area 51, but its primary purpose is said to be the development of experimental aircraft and weapons. A series of game-changing stealth fighters have been developed around Area 51's Groom Lake, and sonic booms are so common that local ranchers barely notice them. As for the theories that the base harbours aliens and studies UFOs, which have lingered since the Roswell Incident in 1947, the US government revealed in 2017 that it had a \$22 million programme – thought to be based at Area 51 – to collect and analyse "anomalous aerospace threats".

When I drive up to Area 51's dusty entrance later that day, it's still very much active. At the first of two barricades, there are at least ten warning signs, promising fines and prison sentences for taking photographs or trespassing. I turn around in haste, and take off back to Rachel, where the Comic Sans town sign ("Population. Humans: Yes. Aliens: ?") is much more welcoming.

There's not, it has to be said, much to do along the Extraterrestrial Highway. Back at the inn, I simply buy a few naff fridge magnets and settle in at a table next to three sad-looking alien mannequins to try the \$6.75 alien burger. Later, I chat to Chris Bickel, a retired local





schoolteacher who passes her time by knitting ET quilts. She has seen strange things in the sky – craft moving "faster than anything you've seen, and doing 90-degree turns" – but tells me the best person to speak to about that stuff is Ken, the inn's chef, who sometimes refers to himself as Agent 0051.

Around 9pm Ken appears after his shift wearing his Chicago Cubs cap backwards. As we speak outside on plastic chairs under a dark desert sky, it turns out that he's not your average burger flipper. The disowned son of a wealthy industrialist family, he claims he was "the hottest chef in Atlanta" from the mid-1970s, cooking at Elon Musk's 40th birthday, and "for every branch of the military and intelligence services", sparking a life-

long interest in the CIA and other agencies. He claims a Native American shaman in New Mexico told him to put his finger on an atlas to determine where his destiny lay. His finger alighted on Rachel, Nevada.

I follow Ken's car to his bungalow by the highway, where he feeds me Jack Daniel's and scarcely believable tales. He's Rachel's unofficial spokesperson for what really happens at Area 51, and he "sees things up in the sky all the time. One time, I saw four planes circling. They were dissected by a huge single beam of white light, and then suddenly they disappeared, leaving only little flickers of light."

He tells me about the technology being developed "over the hill": gravity manipulation, cloaking technology, vibrational frequencies that can make aircraft vanish. "If you've seen it in a sci-fi movie, they can do it," he says. A few weeks later, I'll listen to a radio interview of him claiming he was abducted by aliens. We don't quite get round to that. Besides, my brain is scrambled enough, and I'm weirded out by Ken's assertion that, "They can see us and hear everything we say." Who "they" are remains unsaid.

The next morning, after breakfast, Pat is keen to point out that, "Ken's views are his own... we like to keep things light here." Soon I'm driving up towards Tonopah – best known as the home of the haunted Mizpah Hotel and the Clown Motel, a nightmare of clown dolls and swirly carpets. Crucially, it also has the first gas in 160 miles.

But as I will the car up the final hill, the accelerator finally gives up, and I trundle to a halt. After 15 minutes of forlorn thumbing, a truck turns round on the dusty road, and a gentleman wills me to jump in. He's the retired sheriff of Tonopah, and he has a spare stash of gas back home. As we drive, he asks about my trip, possibly jokingly: "You see some strange stuff down there, did you?" Yes, I say. Very strange indeed. And, as the words come out of my mouth, I realise I'm not joking.

hisper it so Marty McFly doesn't hear, but it turns out that you don't actually need a souped-up 1985 DeLorean and some stonewashed denim to travel back in time. A ticket to Seattle and car to take you two hours further to the very tip-top corner of the Pacific Northwest will do the trick just as well.

That's because in Port Townsend, a paper mill town that, with its creaky wooden houses and deserted winding roads, feels like the set of a David Lynch movie, you'll find a couple who have done more than nip back to the recent past. For Sarah and Gabriel Chrisman, the tail fins and cowlicks of the 1950s aren't nearly old enough. Nor are the Prohibition bars and ragtime jazz of the Roaring Twenties. For this couple, the clock stopped somewhere around the 1890s.

"Oh yes, it's all absolutely real," Sarah insists as she ushers me into their home past three penny farthing bicycles, a cooking range and an ice box. There's a

notable absence of iPads, flat screens or even cassette decks. "Trust us, there's no 'breakout' box of trainers and mobile phones which come out when visitors leave," chuckles her husband Gabriel.

Librarian Gabriel is dressed in checked breeches and a prim-andtrim white shirt with cardboard collar. His facial hair gives him the look of an exceptionally dapper 19th-century bank clerk who's about to turn me down for a loan. Sarah is in a floor-length, seaweed-patterned cotton dress she made herself. She looks like she could give an impassioned speech about the suffragette movement at any minute. Instead I'm offered a glass of homemade lemonade in the quiet of their living room where it's time to ask some tough questions about their lifestyle choices. The Victorian era was a time of child poverty, Jack the Ripper and rampant colonisation. Why not live in a happier time – or, at least one where there was less cholera?

"Slavery was over by late Victorian times and it wasn't this terrible time for women that's often made out," says Sarah. "People think everything is black or white, and that the past was a certain way. In the 1880s people in America were cooking with lemons and the banana was more popular than the apple! It wasn't as different to today as you might think."

As fun as their lifestyle seems, it's not been the smoothest ride. "My family don't really understand what we're doing at all," Sarah admits. "I had a woman run me off the road in an SUV not long ago. She told me I shouldn't be riding my bike in my skirt!"

So why did they choose to live like Victorians in the first place? "Gabriel and I met at university, and quickly we realised we had this shared passion for Victorian times," says Sarah. "It was an era where incredible things were achieved, great books were written and advancements were made that we're still benefiting from today." It was only after dating for 10 years that the immersion began when Gabriel bought Sarah a Victorianera corset for her 29th birthday. A corset as the portal to time travel? "It just happened to be around the time that we began engaging in a deeper way and, a decade on, we're still finding ourselves getting deeper into the Victorian era," says Sarah.

The adjustment was different for them both. Gabriel grew up in a house without TV and was homeschooled. Sarah was raised in a more conventional home with a TV which, as she puts it, "was a glowing box blaring commands at me".

"We never had a burning of our modern possessions," says Gabriel. "But we did get rid of a lot of stuff when we moved to this house. We got rid of a lot of the technology as well."

But something's amiss. The freshly baked loaf of bread in the kitchen, alongside the vintage egg whisk and saucepan, is a testament to their authenticity – but hold on a second, isn't that a 21st-century car parked outside? Sarah and Gabriel happily admit to owning the car, alongside a laptop, which Sarah uses for email, to write novels and to maintain a blog called *This Victorian Life.* "And I still use a modern razor," adds Gabriel. >







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"Sarah bought me a Victorian straight razor, but I haven't got the knack of it yet. I'm working on it though!"

"We believe in modern dentistry too," adds Sarah. "And I dream of visiting London to go to the Victoria and Albert Museum. I think I would fly if we could afford to get over there."

So where exactly does the Victoriana end and the age of Viagra and Vin Diesel begin? I can't resist asking how much modern culture seeps into their lives – for example, do they know who Stephen Colbert and James Corden are? "Are they politicians?" asks Sarah.

The couple don't read newspapers and have no interest in current affairs. Gabriel does have health insurance through his job, but he is as true to the Victorian era as possible while working. "I'm allowed to dress exactly as I am now at the library," he says. "I just have to put a name badge on my shirt. Everyone is fine with it. People who read a lot tend to be more open-minded I find, so the library is a great place to work."

"It's virtually impossible to live completely in Victorian times," says Sarah as the three of us take a bike ride. "But we go as far as we can with it all the time." And so, with Gabriel on his penny far-

thing and Sarah and I lagging slightly behind on more conventional – but still pretty ancient – bicycles, we decide to hit the town, 1890s style.

After 20 minutes of furious pedalling we arrive at Fort Warden, a little-known complex built to protect the area from potential invasion in the 1890s. Gabriel usually takes a vintage bike (sometimes even the penny farthing) on his daily commute. Cycling 12 miles per day means he's able to eat a Victorianstyle diet that's heavy on meat and generous in size.

"Cornflakes and things like that were coming in at the end of the 19th century," he informs me. "But we can eat bacon and lots of protein because we burn it all off. The Victorian way of life is very active!"

But is it more expensive? "In the summer we spend about ten dollars a day on ice to keep the perishable foods from going off," says Sarah. "But in other ways

living a Victorian life in 2019 is very cheap. We have no cell phones or TV for a start. And our water, gas and electric bill is so low that the companies essentially only charge us a connection fee and nothing else."

Back at their house, I take a peek in Sarah's writer's den where vintage wolverine, otter, skunk and fox furs rest on the back of the rocking chair where she writes her novels. In their bedroom everything from the feather mattress and the antique pitcher and bowl for washing their faces date back to the Victorian era, or are very faithful reproductions.

"There were only two dreams I had in life. I wanted to be a writer and I wanted to live in Victorian times," says Sarah, as I bid adieu. "They've both come true!"

Driving away from the house, I silently abandon my own secret plans to build a time machine – it turns out all I need is to get the right clothes and to

forget everything I ever knew about James Corden. Suddenly living in the past has never seemed so appealing.

The brainchild of entrepreneur Billy McFarland and rapper Ja Rule, Fyre was supposed to be a luxury festival to promote a new app – hence the early involvement of influencers such as Kendall Jenner, Bella Hadid and Emily Ratajkowski. But that was the only thing the organisers got right. Having lost their location, caterer and bands, they decided to keep going to try to break even. What emerges is a salutary tale for the ages – not that anyone will bother learning from it.

Packing for a trip can take some skill, even for the most seasoned traveller. Making a decision on what to bring and what to leave behind can be tricky, especially when your bag is already bulging and you need an outfit for every occasion.

As an airline, packing is something we take seriously. We have to get it right, and not just to make sure we have everything we need. While planning what we'll put onboard to make sure you have a comfortable flight, we weigh every single product so we can ensure we're keeping the plane as light as

possible. Why? It's simple. The less we carry, the less fuel we use. By using less fuel we produce fewer carbon emissions, and that's our number one environmental priority. Even small changes in weight add up to a big difference. For example, if you've already plugged in to our inflight entertainment system, you may have noticed that your headphones are no longer in a plastic bag. They're now wrapped in our Change for Children charity envelopes. Not only will that avoid approximately 17 tonnes of plastic waste each year, we've also saved 9 tonnes per year in onboard weight.

Headphones We don't wrap headphones in plastic anymore, which saves 17 tonnes of

waste each year.

The magazine you're reading is different too. As well as a makeover, a small change in size has saved 13kg per flight. That's 68,199kg of CO₂ every year across our fleet.
